

GOLDEN MOMENTS

I have a little kingdom I look after. It is around three foot deep and five feet in length, and I had got great pleasure over the summer in getting the water clear and stocking this little world with aquatic plants that both decorate the pond and oxygenate the water at the same time. In June I stocked this little world with twelve Goldfish: five orange Comets, five bespeckled Shubunkins and two larger common goldfish.

When working from home, I would take welcome breaks from emails or service preparation by gazing into this little world and watching the fish frolic in the clear water and dart around their little kingdom. They were well fed and I kept the surface water free of leaves, duckweed and the dreaded blanket-weed.

However, a couple of weeks ago it was a very windy and stormy day as we went out to church and when I returned that afternoon I discovered this little world had been ravaged! Plants were at the bottom of the water, including some rocks and the fish were nowhere to be seen. So I got changed and went into the pond to retrieve the plants and rocks and restore order to my little world. However, the fish were still nowhere to be seen the following day and then I realised that something worse than a storm had hit my pond! We are not sure whether it was a Heron, an otter or even a person who robbed us of our fish but only a little orange comet remains of this family, and they, too timid to feed, hid in the foliage out of sight. I was really saddened by this event, as you begin to build a relationship with your fish, and they would come to the surface as soon as I began cleaning the pond surface and would happily feed very close to me. But my world was now barren, and not knowing what predator had visited my pond made it worse as I didn't know how to protect it?

Then on the Sunday of the Baptism in October, as I arrived I was called by someone as I entered the church and they gave me a tub of five goldfish! They had heard of the plight of my pond and had thoughtfully gone to their pond to help restock mine! This was a true 'golden' moment! A generous thought that resulted in a thoughtful gift that has brought life back to my little world!

The joy I experienced as I released those five goldfish into their new world and watched them explore their new surrounds was lovely. Someone had heard about my situation and decided to give me a little gold! A small act of kindness that went a long way.

Is there someone you know of that would benefit from a little gold – a small act of kindness that says 'you matter'? Thank you to the giver of my gold (fish) – her example of kindness has inspired me and hopefully you too, to give 'gold' to others...

Paris in 4 days by bike



On Wednesday 25th September I set off with my son David and son-in-law Stuart from the outskirts of London with the aim of reaching Paris in four days. Susan drove in parallel and we met up with her at lunchtimes and each evening. She was able to take our things so that we could cycle without too much baggage.

The first day we encountered some hilly terrain in the north of Sussex, then we picked up a disused railway line known as the "Cuckoo Trail" – a lovely traffic-free route that I would recommend for family cycling. We finished the first day along a very windy seafront from Seaford to Newhaven, arriving in good time for the evening ferry crossing.

We spent the night in a rented apartment in Dieppe, from where we set out on another disused railway path and enjoyed a long stretch of off-road cycling, though Stuart had the first puncture of our trip and rain was a persistent companion on Day 2. Fortunately the heaviest downpour was right at the end of the day as we cycled into Gournay-en-Bray, so we were able to change out of our things and enjoy a relaxing evening.

Day 3 was the longest stretch – 99 kilometres. We went from Gournay through Gisors, Bray-et-Lu, through a national park area known as the Vexin to finish the day in Cergy-Pontoise.



David had three punctures, but apart from that we managed the distance OK and the weather was more favourable. Cergy-Pontoise is a new town on the outskirts of Paris, and our hotel was in a retail park which included a Decathlon sports shop where David could buy a couple of new tyres and inner tubes! It was only about 50 kilometres to our destination at the Eiffel Tower, but the journey on Day 4 was complicated by some blocked roads and we were grateful to be able to use Google Maps to find a new route. Eventually we cycled into the middle of Paris, which had a variety of cycle lanes that we were able to use to arrive safely at the Trocadero (where the photo was taken) before crossing the river Seine to the Eiffel Tower. We didn't go up it as the queues were very long, but we enjoyed a relaxing river cruise in the late afternoon and finished our day in Montmartre.



We put the bikes on the back of the car to drive home. It was lovely to have time with the younger men, we were grateful to be safe and uninjured, and it was certainly a type of trip that I would like to repeat.

In addition, we were able to do some fundraising for deserving causes. Stuart raised some funds for Multiple Sclerosis research, David and I raised funds for the Rafiki Thabo Foundation (see last month's Focus). Thank you to those who have supported us.

Thank you for support of the Foodbank at Harvest Festival.


Almost 38 kg of non perishable food was donated in addition to a good amount which went to Open Door for their work.

from Revd Graeme Ross Regional Minister, Eastern Baptist Association

So, when was the last time that you realized that you were wrong about something to do with following Jesus?

If your answer is 'I don't know' and you're not Jesus then I would suggest that you have a problem.

The Bible is full of language about growth, change and journeying, some examples are:

• Let us run with perseverance the race marked out for us (Hebrews 12.1)

• Not that I have already obtained all this, or have already arrived at my goal, but I press on to take hold of that for which Christ Jesus took hold of me. (Philippians 3.12)

• Be transformed by the renewal of your mind, that by testing you may discern what is the will of God, what is good and acceptable and perfect. (Romans 12.2)

• And we all, who with unveiled faces reflect] the Lord's glory, are being transformed into his image with ever-increasing glory (2 Corinthians 3.18)

We are supposed to follow Jesus as his disciples, devoted to life long learning. Obviously we can pass on the things we have learnt to others but in doing so we must never lose sight of the reality that we too are disciples who should be trying to continually learn from and to become more like our master.

In Acts we read about Saul who lived his life fanatically trying to serve and to please God but then he had an encounter with God on the road to Damascus, he realized how wrong he had been and his life was never the same. Once upon a time I believed that the Bible taught that women couldn't be called by God to be Ministers and I was puzzled by the Christians who weren't seeing what appeared to be clear in scripture. While I was studying theology I wrote a paper to show that my understanding of the Bible was right but as I engaged with the various passages at a deeper level I was shocked to realize how wrong I had been.

Once upon a time I believed that Ministers are called to primarily to build churches up but then I realized a few years ago that Jesus is building his church and that our part of this work is to make disciples. This changed the way I engaged in ministry as I started to consider how to make disciples who can then in turn make disciples rather than just trying to keep the church functioning whilst doing a bit of evangelism on the side. The realization that Sunday services shouldn't be the only gateway to discipleship and church came as quite a shock to me but as a result of embracing this, people have come to faith and been discipled who otherwise wouldn't have been.

Once upon a time I believed that the point of church was to primarily to equip people to live out their faith in church life but then I encountered the concept of whole life discipleship which made sense of the scriptures in a whole new way. Cleopas and his friend met Jesus on the road to Emmaus and when reflecting on their journey with him they said 'Were not our hearts burning within us while he talked with us on the road and opened the Scriptures to us?'

I hope and pray that our hearts desire is that Jesus would open the scriptures to us and that our hearts would burn within us as he leads us through change as we grow in our faith, becoming more like him.
